# Y OF MISSING BONDS NOT SO

Amount Due Interior Institution Made Good but Not With Paper Demanded in Threatened Suit-Story of Transaction.

Thomas C. Devlin, as receiver for the Oregon Trust & Savings bank, at noon yesterday, delivered to A. N. Orcutt, attorney for the Bank of Drain, bonds of the Puget Sound Telephone company representing \$9800, together with interest due October 1, 1907, April 1, 1908, October 1, 1908 and April 1, 1909. The bonds delivered by Mr. Devlin were not those bought by the Oregon Trust for the Bank of Drain in March, 1907, and sought by the Bank of Drain since that time. They were other bonds, representing the same amount of money, and the interest due the Bank of Drain was paid in cash because some one had cashed the coupons of the Drain bank's bonds

Who now holds the bonds originally sold to the Bank of Drain is a mystery. How they disappeared from the safety deposit vaults of the German-American bank is unexplained. Who took them, without order or authority of the Bank of Drain and collected the interest on coupons as that interest fell due, is a riddle, the answer to which may be known to the receiver of the Ore-

Bosion April 30.—The safety of Mrs. Rose Lambert and her American companion at Hadjin was reported today by W. W. Peet, treasurer of the Turklish missions with headquarters at Constantinovie, who cabled to the foreign missions board, appealing for funds. "The need of relief funds to increasing," says Peet. "There are 20,000 persons to feed at Adama alone. The hospitals and orphanages are crowded. "We are feeding 4000 persons at Tarsus and a large number at Antioch Marish.
