GENERAL OREGON NEWS

Oregon Irrigation Congress, to
be held at Portland, January
9-11, Promises to be Very
Interesting Affair

Probably the most interesting
feature of the Oregon Irrigation
Congress, to be held in Portland
Jan. 9-11, will be a session given
up to the actual experiences of
the farmers on irrigated lands.
This series of talks will be high-
ly instructive and show just what
is needed to aid irrigation in
Oregon.

There will be, also addresses
and discussions well worth
hearing. The three day session
will conclude with a banquet.

Oregon is preeminent among
the states in the value and
amount of standing timber,
according to the report of the
State Board of Forestry. Not
only that, but it has one fifth of
all the standing timber in the
United States and Oregon now
stands fourth in the annual cut of
lumber. Oregon has approximat-
ely as much timber as all the
states east of the Rocky Moutains
put together.

Oregon people who visited the
land shows at Minneapolis and
Chicago advise that this state
make a stronger showing than
ever next year. They say many
people attracted to the opportu-
nities here by the exhibit of Ore-
gon products and next year will
see many newcomers in the state
as a result.

The director of the census is
preparing to issue complete fig-
ures on agricultural production
of this state for 1909. He finds
that Oregon produced crops in
that year to the value of \$49,-
041,000.

Vacant lots in cities and towns
should be used to grow poultry,
according to Secretary Minton of
the Oregon Poultry Association.
He says egg and poultry produc-
tion would be increased 25 per
cent if this were done.

As usual, Oregon Christmas
trees lent holiday cheer to Cali-
fornians. One steamer carried
1200 trees south.

Oregon Agricultural College News
To give Oregonians who can-
not come to the agricultural col-
lege the benefit of its help plans
have just been made by the col-
lege extension division. It is
planned to carry the college
assistance into every town every
farm in the state.

The plans provide for demon-
stration farms in different sec-
tions; demonstration trains; lec-
tures; demonstrations, farmer's
institutes at commercial clubs,
and in cooperation with other or-
ganizations; traveling schools;
correspondence course; popular
bulletins; educational exhibits
for county fairs and meetings;
local advisors; aid in organizing
rural communities for betterment
work; aid in industrial work in
the schools; and cooperation
with the federal government in
assisting rural Oregon.

A distribution of branch ex-
periment stations as required to
solve the problems of different
parts of the state is also planned.

Conferences with representa-
tives of various sections will be
held and a plan drawn up to sub-
mit to the board of regents.

That the future development
of the state is dependent all to-
gether on the farmers in general
and particularly on those who
are progressive and always find
time for study and the adoption
of advanced methods was asserted
by Dr. James Withycombe in
his lecture to visiting farmers on
"Agricultural Opportunities in
Oregon" at the Oregon Agri-
cultural College.

"After Oregon's magnificent
forests are reduced to stumps,
after her mines are abandoned
as holes in the ground the farms
of Oregon will continue to re-

spond to proper cultivation by
fabulously increasing the 'wealth
of their owners,' said Dr. Withy-
combe.

He showed that present rural
conditions would be revolution-
ized by the advent of intensive
farmers from Europe when the
Panama Canal opens the water
route. Every Oregonian, he
urged, should take advantage of
his first opportunity to get con-
trol of a piece of Oregon land
and improve it, in order that they
may secure their just share of
the advantages which invariably
come with increased population.
