## TWO DIE IN FREIGHT WRECK

A bad freight wreck occurred early Monday morning on the Southern Pacific at Vorhies station, 2 miles south of Medford. The wreck was caused by the breaking of an axle on a huge dredger, derailing about 13 cars and tearing up the track for a distance of 500 feet. Out of about twenty hoboos riding in an empty car, two were so seriously injured that they died after being taken to the hospital. A half dozen others received painful injuries. None of the crew were injured.

A feature of the accident was that two black cats ran in front of the engine, just before the crash. One was killed, and the other was pulled from the wreckage at noon, where it was pinned all morning. The number of cars derailed was 13.

Wrecking trains from Ashland and Roseburg were rushed to the scene, and after eight hours work cleared the tangled mass of debris from the track. During this time all traffic was suspended.

The speed was 40 miles an hour. Some of the cars were hurled ten feet off the rails, by the force of the crash.

Three oil cars were wrecked, throwing oil over the wreckage.

## EVANGELIST ABLE SPEAKER.

Rev. Harry E. Tucker, who is conducting the evangelistic services at the Christian Church, is a forceful and earnest speaker. Sunday evening a large audience listened to a masterful sermon, Rev. Tucker taking as a basis for his theme: "What am I to do with Jesus, who is called Christ?" and "He that hath the Son hath life." He emphasized the point that good deeds alone will not gain salvation but that it is essential that "We must confess Him before the world to have eternal life." He drew a striking picture of Christ before Pilate, when he asked the multitude "What shall I do with Jesus," and they answered "Crucify Him." He illustrated how even today we are easily swayed by the throng. The question we daily face, he said, is not one of good deeds but "what are you going to do with Jesus?" His closing words were an exhortation for all to publicly acknowledge Christ as our Saviour and to follow him in word and deed.

Rev. Tucker's sermons compel attention. His vivid word pictures are masterful in expressiveness. Those who have not heard him should not let the opportunity to do so slip by unimproved.
