MURDERER CAPTURED.

He Tells a Story of His Terrible Work.

CHICAGO, Feb. 29.—Zeph Davis, the mulatto who murdered little Maggie McGoughan in a factory, was this morning captured at Forest Hill and brought back here.

He says he ordered the girl to go to work and she replied impudently. This angered him and he threw a hatchet at her. She was badly cut, but picked up a pall and hit him. Then, he says, he lost his mind and, forcing her into a closet, brained her. Davis narrowly escaped lynching in the country.

Cartwright Wants Free Trade.

OTTAWA, Feb. 29.—Notice has been given by Sir Richard Cartwright, who was minister of finance, under the Mackenzie administration, of a resolution setting forth that it is expedient that all articles manufactured in, or natural products of the United States or Canada, should be admitted from ports of one country to another, articles subject to duties, excise or internal revenue alone excepted; also that it is expedient that the Dominion government shall take steps at once to ascertain upon what terms full and free reciprocity with the United States can be secured.

At Last Successful.

MAHONVILLE, Feb. 29.—J. O. Cousins, a well-known barber, afflicted with leprosy, committed suicide this afternoon by taking laudanum. This is the third attempt made. If no inquest is held in will be hard to get a jury.

The Work of a Mob.

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—Masked men from Southampton, Long Island, armed with guns, drove away the watchman from Shinnecock canal, which is to connect Shinnecock bay with the ocean, and destroyed the entire Winter's work.

Murderers Lynched.

CAIRO ILL., Feb. 29.—Last night at Clinton, Ill., Sam Price, the white man who killed a Sheriff, and Bill Beames, colored, who shot a farmer named Jackson, were taken out of jail by about fifty men and lynched.

Killed by a Premature Blast.

SEATTLE, Feb. 29.—A man named Stephen Hall was killed by the premature discharge of a blast to-day on the Seattle, Lake Shore & Eastern Railroad.

Boy Murderer Sentenced.

EASTON, OHIO, Feb. 29.—J. A. Bell, the 13-year-old boy who murdered his mother near here about a year ago, was sentenced by the criminal court to-day to the penitentiary for life.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 29.—At 2:50 p. m. two slight shocks of earthquake were felt here.

VIOLENT AT SANTA ROSA.

SANTA ROSA, Feb. 29.—A violent earthquake occurred at 2:55 o'clock this afternoon. It caused people to run out of their houses through fright. The shock was also severely felt at Petaluma.

An Aged Embezzler.

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—Joseph C. Knight, aged 64 years, the embezzling bookkeeper of the Manufacturers' National Bank, was to-day sentenced to pay a fine of \$3500 and serve seven and a half years in the Penitentiary. Knight had been a clerk for over thirty-one years in this bank, and for about twenty-four years had stolen the bank's money, amounting in all to over \$77,000, before he was found out.

Postmasters Changed.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—Richard L. Chrichman, Postmaster at Williamsco, Polk county, Oregon, has resigned, and D. C. Dougherty has been appointed to take his place.

Chinese Highbinders Commit a Deadly Assault Upon an Aged Man.

TREASURER HILL'S MURDER.

A Sheriff's Son Confesses to a Horrible Crime—A British Vessel Sunk—Weather Indications.

CHINESE DESPERADOES Commit a Fatal Assault Upon an Old Gentleman.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 1.—Early this morning John Gibbs, a man 55 years of age, was assaulted by a gang of Chinese, who, after fatally stabbing him fled. Two Chinese highbinders named Map Tim and La Kee, have been arrested on suspicion of being implicated in the bloody deed. A dagger, the handle of which was covered with blood was found upon La Kee's person. The two Chinamen are notorious highbinders. The assaulted man is a wealthy citizen.

Crown Prince's Throat.

BERLIN, Mar. 1.—Professor Waddicker, the eminent microscopist has received imperative orders to proceed at once to San Remo. It is supposed that the Crown Prince is again troubled with the cancerous growth.

ARRESTED FOR MURDER.

The Murderer of a County Treasurer Confesses his Crime.

BELLVILLE, Texas, March 1.—Tim Forsythe, son of Sheriff Forsythe, of Panola county, was arrested yesterday as the murderer of County Treasurer Hill on the 10th of February. A sack of silver known to be that stolen from the county treasurer when he was murdered, was found in Forsythe's yard and led to his arrest.

A negro barber named Tibbets had been under close surveillance, and Forsythe at first attempted to throw the crime onto him, but finally confessed that he committed the murder by chopping Hill's head off with an axe, while the court house was deserted during the noon adjournment of court. Hill's widow has lost her reason over the horrible tragedy. Forsythe is but 22 years of age.

Demand Increased Wages.

ALBUQUERQUE, New Mexico, March 1.—Brakemen on the mountain division of the Atlantic and Pacific railroad, have demanded a uniform increase of wages and have given the company until 10 o'clock to-morrow to come to terms, or they will strike.

British Vessel Sunk.

LONDON, Mar. 1.—British steamer Edcollett was sunk yesterday at Gibraltar by a collision with the British steamer Mendino. She was on a voyage from Philadelphia to Messina. Both crews were saved.

News of the Chinese's Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—Senator Sherman to-day, from the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs, reported favorably with amendments to Senator Stewart's bill to amend the Chinese Exclusion Act. A vote of 40 yeas and 10 nays was taken.
