Adjourned Until Friday.

Washington, Nov. 24.—After debate between those asking adjournment of the special session and its opponents, the house today adjourned until Friday. At the White House today notice was given out that, on account of the death, in New York last night, of Roosevelt's uncle, James Gracie, the White House is, in mourning, and there will be no further social entertainments, after today, until December 7th, when there is to be a cabinet dinner. The President will attend the funeral Friday.

Dined With Teddy.

Washington, Nov. 24.—Roosevelt dined the Butte labor leaders today, also Congressman Dixon, of Montana. Cortelyou and Wright discussed the wage question at the table. Roosevelt assured his Butte visitors the government was prepared to favor working men whenever the good of the public service was not hampered, and was told in reply that all that labor asked was a square deal. "You will always get that," said the President, so long as I have anything to do with the administration of public affairs.

Mrs. Ollschlager a Legal Wife

County Judge Scott this morning decided the controversy over the appointment of a guardian for Henry Ollschlager, an insane person, by honoring the petition of Mrs. Mary Ollschlager, wife of the insane ward, and appointing Theo. M. Barr as guardian of the person and estate of Henry Ollschlager.

The controversy came up over the petition of Mrs. Ollschlager, when the nephews of Mr. Ollschlager, who reside in California, asked that Geo. G. Bingham be appointed guardian, and that Mrs. Ollschlager be declared to be not the wife of the insane ward. They contended that Ollschlager never married the woman that she was only his housekeeper, and did not have the right to be considered his wife. After the hearing of the case, conducted by P. H. D'Arcy and Governor Chamberlain for Mrs. Ollschlager, and Bonham & Martin for the nephews of Mr. Ollschlager, Judge Scott took the matter under advisement, and this morning he decided the case for Mrs. Ollschlager. Judge Scott said:

"The more I have looked into the case, the more thoroughly I am convinced that the view of the case taken by me at the close of the trial was the correct one. The cases cited by Messrs. Bonham & Martin are not parallel with the one at bar. I must decide the controversy in favor of Mrs. Ollschlager, and my holding will be that Mr. Barr be appointed guardian. He is fully competent, and as his appointment was first petitioned for, he will be appointed, and I will not turn him down. Mr. Bingham whose appointment was also asked for by the other parties, is also fully competent and qualified, but I cannot set aside the petition of Mrs. Ollschlager, and Mr. Barr is appointed."

Mr. Martin, attorney for the nephews of Mr. Ollschlager, gave notice of an appeal to the circuit court, and the case will probably terminate in the supreme court for final adjudication.

Big Mills Shut Down

According to previous announcements the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company's logging camps were all closed Saturday evening, and the men paid off, and told that their services would be indefinitely dispensed with. This throws several hundred men out of employment. A large number of the loggers are in Eugene today, and many will remain here until after Thanksgiving before going to their respective homes in different parts of the state. Many will go to the camps on the Columbia and over in Washington, but reports from the Columbia brings the information that some of the camps there have also closed down, and work may be scarce there also.

As before stated the big mills at Wendling and Saginaw have been closed down for sometime, but it was given out at the company's office this morning that the Coburg and Springfield mills were still running. It was also stated that it would be only a short time before the other mills would start up again. However, this is somewhat at variance with the statements made by Senator R. A. Booth in recent interviews.

The car famine might be soon relieved, and the mills resume operations in a short time, according to the statements made this morning.

Reduction of Wages.

The employees of the Booth-Kelly Company have been notified of a new schedule of wages, which will go into effect December 1st.

This schedule makes a reduction of 25 cents per day on all men receiving \$2 a day or less, and 50 cents a day on all receiving more than \$2 per day.

The Pacific Lumber Company operating mills at Drain, Alca and Rouse, have been compelled to shut down, with the exception of the Drain mill, on account of being unable to obtain cars.

This company employs several hundred men, and their payroll amounts to \$14,000 or \$15,000 per month. Nearly all the employees are now idle.

Mr. Campbell, the manager of the plant, says conditions are not bright.

It wouldn't be a bad idea if the legislature of Oregon would look into this car famine business, and pass some stringent measures that would assure us that a repetition would not occur soon again.

To Derail the Train.

Cheerbourg, France, Nov. 24.—Two attempts were made to derail the train bearing the king and queen of Italy Sunday, while they were returning to Rome. A soldier, near Marselles, piled rocks on the track, but was discovered. Three anarchists were arrested near Arles for putting spikes in the rail. The officers succeeded in suppressing the news until this morning.

A Sport Dead.

London, Nov. 24.—Sir John Maple, a noted horseman and sportsman, is dead.
